




Tēnā koutou katoa! Nau mai, haere mai ki te wā motuhake nei, ko te wā o Matariki.

For everyone, an introduction to understanding and writing your own pepeha - i.e. a particular format that recounts your ancestry. Learn how to describe in te reo Māori who you are and where you come from, naming the people and places that are important to you. Celebrate our feathered friends of the forest. Tupuārangi is the star from the Matariki cluster who is linked to food and growth above ground and in the trees. Have fun making a quirky kākāpō or ruru to decorate your home for Matariki.

Stargazing at Mākotukutuku | Cape Wanbrow Lookout

Indoor Astronomy with StarLab, Tūhura Otago Museum's portable planetarium at Öamaru **Opera House**
